
- ON the match-front Osprey's Lakeside trip saw Ed Blane with 127lb as Chris Lovelock netted 98lb and Gary Page 95lb.

## PLEASE keep watch on waters!

PLEASE watch for dead or distressed fish. Recent days have seen Environment Agency fisheries staff run ragged investigating sporadic stillwater fish deaths – mainly carp – across the region.

Causes are thought to vary from combinations of spawning and rapid temperature change stress to low oxygen levels and sudden algal blooms/deaths.

If you should see signs of such incidents PLEASE report immediately to the Environment Agency on 0800 80 70 60 – and not rely on posting haphazard comments on facebook. Your call could save a fishery!
